Evaluation of Student Learning 2025-2026: Elementary

Schools must provide students, parents and guardians with a summary of the Standards and Procedures for the Evaluation of Student Learning at the beginning of the school year. This document specifies the main types of evaluation that will be carried out and when they will take place during the year. You will find information below concerning the evaluation and reporting of your child's progress.

Students with Special Needs

Please note that some students with special needs are provided with an individualized program to meet their needs. The teachers, in collaboration with the school's resource department, develop Individual Education Plans (IEPs) that outline the individualized programs, strategies implemented as well as resource support measures.

Official Communications: Please note that you will receive the following official communications during the school year, they are all accessible on the Parent Portal:	
Progress Report	By October 15 th , you will receive the progress report, which will include comments on your child's learning and behavior.
Term 1 Report Card	The Term 1 Report Card will be issued by November 20 th . This report card will cover the period from August 29 th to October 31 st and will count for 20% of the final mark for the year. Report cards will be accessible on the Portal on November 20 th .
Term 2 Report Card	The Term 2 Report Card will be issued by March 15 th . This report card will cover the period from November 3 rd to February 13 th and will count for 20% of the final mark for the year. Report cards will be accessible on the Portal on Feb 19 th .
Term 3 Report Card	The Term 3 Report Card will be issued by July 10 th . It will cover the period from February 16 th to June 23 rd and will count for 60% of the final mark for the year. Report cards will be accessible on the Portal during the June PD days.

At Wakefield School, students will receive a Progress Report based on the first 6 weeks of school. Please note that this is a snapshot of their progress and is based on a rubric for academic effort and behavioural observations. For Term 1, the report card will only have marks and no comments, and the teaching teams will organize interviews with all parents to discuss their child's progress to date. In Term 2, there will be detailed comments and interviews will be held for invited parents. In Term 3, there will be detailed comments and no interviews.

For Terms 1 and 2, the teacher enters a percentage mark that reflects the knowledge and competencies that a student has acquired - based on the evaluations carried out during the term (tests, assignments, etc.). In the case of English Language Arts, Mathematics and French, Second Language, a Subject Mark is calculated on the basis of the weightings assigned to the subject-specific competencies established by MEQ (see subject table on the first page). MEQ = Ministère de l'Éducation de Québec *Please note that 60% and above is a passing mark in a subject.		For the 3rd Term, the teacher enters a percentage mark that covers the student's learning as a whole for the year (knowledge and competencies).	The 3rd term includes a Final Mark. <i>It is calculated using the results of the three weighted terms (20%, 20%, 60%) and the MEQ exam results (if applicable).</i> <i>*The MEQ exam counts for 20% of the Final Mark. This only applies in Cycle 3.2 English Language Arts and Mathematics.</i>

The report cards will also include comments on the following general competencies at the end of the first and third term:

- Term 1: *Organizes his/her work and Works in a team*
- Term 3: *Organizes his/her work and Communicates effectively*
